Message from the President

Greetings from Fairborn, Ohio! While our latest, and first joint, reunion is still fresh in my 70-yearold mind, I would like to share my reflections on that wonderful event. When we, the 98th Bomb Group, decided to join up with other bomb groups for a joint reunion, I had mixed feelings. Past reunions with just "us" were SO much fun, and all of us got to know each other so well; each reunion became a 'gotta do' event. However, for many reasons, at the Harrisburg reunion in 2018, with barely enough attendees to be able to charter a bus for tours,

During a performance of a slow song, one of the singers announced, "I'm looking for someone to dance with" and selected a gentleman who turned out to be 104 years old! He danced well, but the best dancers, by far, were our own Barbra and Alex Tejeda. Linda and I had to drive back to Ohio the next day, so we missed the events on Sunday, but sure did have a great time.

Sadly, the joy of the reunion was soon tempered by a phone call from Marion Ladislaw, informing me that her Bob had passed. Bob held leadership positions within our association, the latest one being in charge of our memorabilia, and was so much fun to be with at reunions. He processed a very impressive collection of Air Force patches, coins, and photos at his home. He will be missed greatly.

98th Bomb Group/Wing Veterans Association Force for Freedom Scholarship

In Memory of Sgt. William H. Simons

Once again it is time to start thinking about the 98th Bomb Group/Wing Veterans Association's \$2,000 Scholarship Award for 2020. It is awarded annually to a young person who wants to continue their education at a university, community college, technical or trade school. To qualify they should:

 Have at least a 2.5 grade point average in high school

- Be a patriotic person who believes in the American ideals
- Be recommended by a member of the 98th Bomb Group/Wing Association

Applicants should have a fairly clear idea of what they want their continuing education to do for them and the career they are hoping to follow.

The Association intends this scholarship to go to an individual that otherwise might not have an opportunity to further their education, and not to someone who already has several awarded scholarships. The \$2000 Award will be paid directly to the school chosen by the young person for their tuition.

A complete Application for the Scholarship consists of:

- The Applicant Form completed by the person applying for the Scholarship.
- The Member Form completed by the sponsoring Association member.
- An Official Transcript of the applicant's high school grades upon completion of three quarters of their senior year.

Completed packages should be mailed to the Scholarship Chairman at the address listed below no later than 30 June 2020.

The Scholarship Committee will review all applications and select the applicant to receive the Scholarship. Selection will be made based on need, realistic goals for the education sought, Patriotism, and how well the person is thought of by the sponsoring member. In Memory of SMSgt Robert Ladislaw

SMSgt Robert Ladislaw, USAF (Ret) passed peacefully at the Dayton VA Hospice October 5th, 2019. He was married to his loving wife Marian for 61 years. His Parents, Siblings, and his daughter Therese Ladislaw preceded him in death. Bob will be watching over his wife Marian, daughter Ann (Gary) Detro, grandchildren Marie Keaton, Lisa (Kyle) Marcum, Bob Ladislaw, and Chris Cusick; great grandchildren Elizabeth, Ava, and Scarlett, as well as numerous nieces and nephews, and many lifelong friends.

Bob's Honorable Service to the United States Air Force spanned 40 years. He volunteered at the National Museum of the United States Air Force for 22 years and received the Director's Award for Volunteer of the Year. He was a member of the 91st Strategic Reconnaissance Wing, B-47 Stratojet Association, B-52 Stratofortress Association, Air Force Association Iron Gate Chapter,

Knights of Columbus, Disabled American Veterans, VFW Post 3283, and American Legion Post 526.

Recording from WWII shows soldier's love for family...

Oscar Spaly's voice crackled on the recording—but his family didn't mind. The message to his wife, Lois, has been played countless times in the decades since it originally was recorded at a basic training camp in Mississippi during World War II.

Documented on a 7-inch vinyl disc that arrived in a cardboard envelope with Pepsi-Cola branding, his words of affirmation flowed from the speakers. "Hello, sweetheart. I'm always thinking of you."

The recording was one of many sent from servicemen and women to their families at the height of the war. The soda brand set up free recoding booths in major cities and took travel equipment to canteens across the country for soldiers to send one-minute messages home. Many were sent before soldiers were deployed overseas.

Decades later, one of the Spaly's sons, Doug, found it and played it over and over throughout his childhood. Speaking on this year's Veterans Day, Oscar Spaly's eldest son, Ann Arbor resident Robert Spaly, said his brother digitized the warped record in 2014. It can be heard at bit.ly/a2record.

"It's the kind of thing you wish you'd known about earlier," Robert Spaly said. "I'm sure she heard it over and over again when my younger brother played it over and over again as a kid. I'm sure she got a kick out of it. She was the kind that just adored her husband."

Robert Spaly believes his mother was living in their hometown of Flint when the recording was made at Camp Shelby in Mississippi. By then, his father was an officer, training at that location before being deployed to Europe.

Oscar Spaly led a platoon in the Battle of the Bulge, his son said. He and his soldiers were missing in action for several weeks. Robert's mother received a telegram announcing they were found three weeks after the first notification they were missing. He would return home safe.

The WWII veteran avoided talking about the war until the last few years of his life, Robert Spaly said. When he opened up, he talked about how bad it was to live in tents over a grueling winter during the Battle of the Bulge.

The family moved to Ann Arbor in the 1950s so Oscar Spaly could study economics at the University of Michigan. He retired from the Army Reserve as a major and eventually established the real estate company known as Spaly Group, which is still family owned.

Lois Spaly died in 1997 at 75. Eleven years later, Oscar Spaly died at 88. But the message to his wife remains in the family's memories, and on recordings. The sentiment of a personally crafted message in an unconventional medium closes out the recording.

"By the way, how do you like this record? Beats letter-writing any day. So, for the moment, your loving husband says, 'Bless you, love.'"

Bob loved his family and friends, and his country. He was buried with military honors at Dayton National Cemetery, Monday, November 4, 2019. "Bob with the one O" will be dearly missed.





Saturday, 9/21




Sunday, 9/22




